SATURDAY, JULY 1

You shall walk in all the ways which the LORD your God has commanded you, that you may live and that it may be well with you...

Deuteronomy 5:33 (NKJV)

As MY SOON-TO-BE TWENTY-TWO-YEAR-OLD DAUGHTER and I waited in the checkout line, I scanned the merchandise displays for impulse purchases. A bright, green-striped beach bag caught my attention. It would be perfect for our upcoming family vacation.

The tote was well constructed with room for towels, sunscreen, and snacks. I put the straps on my shoulder and remembered the days of traipsing through the shifting, white sand to a vacant spot down the beach, away from the crowd. When my daughter was young, her feet would sink in the deep sand. She struggled to walk as she tried to keep up with her father and me.

"Walk where Daddy stepped," I said, as I bent down to her eye level and pointed to where her father's footprints burrowed out the sand. She stretched her thin legs, hopping and jumping to match his stride. I followed behind, also taking advantage of the path my husband had made. It was easy and effortless for both my daughter and me.

Placing the beach bag on the checkout counter, I looked up at my daughter, who stands a head taller than me. She can now forge her own path through the deep sand, but my hope is that we both remember how much better it is to walk in the footprints of the One who goes before us. —KAREN SARGENT

SUNDAY, JULY 2

When they saw the courage of Peter and John and realized that they were unschooled, ordinary men, they were astonished and they took note that these men had been with Jesus. Acts 4:13 (NIV)

MY HUSBAND AND I ARE happily married, but the "happy" part didn't happen automatically. Early in our marriage, I blurted out my emotions without considering their impact. I was quick to judge his actions while making excuses for my own behavior. I would spend hours on tasks that consumed me, overworking and leaving very little time for us as a couple. Even though I was overly sensitive to his constructive criticism, I knew I needed to change. I wanted a second chance.

The Peter in Acts is very different from the Peter in Matthew. In Acts 4, Peter courageously and unapologetically preaches the gospel of Jesus, while back in Matthew 26, he denied knowing Jesus. So what made the difference? Jesus gave Peter a second chance. Peter learned from his mistake and reconciled with Jesus (John 21:15–19).

Change isn't easy. We all make mistakes. It took practice and prayer, but, fortunately, after twenty years of marriage I'm a different (and, more importantly, a better) wife today than I was when I first married. I'm open to asking for and accepting feedback. I show more empathy toward my husband's perspective. I take time to think before I speak and try to be fully present when we're together. I'm thankful to my husband, and Jesus, for second chances. —Ericka Loynes

MONDAY, JULY 3

Even if my father and mother abandon me, the LORD will hold me close. Psalm 27:10 (NLT)

One of MY favorite things is when I see my little children climbing onto my husband's lap or snuggling by his side. Even though my youngest kids are ten and eleven years old, they want to sit near him, especially during family movie night. They like being close to their dad because of the relationship that he's built with them. Years of providing for them, hugging them, and listening to them have created a special closeness.

It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery. Galatians 5:1 (NIV)

PICNICS AND FIREWORKS, MOSQUITO BITES and the scent of sunscreen—all conjure the memory of July 4th gatherings. I'm so grateful for the freedom I enjoy in my country. Liberty is a treasure worth celebrating with noisy fireworks and rousing marches from a local band.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 5

When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." John 8:12 (NIV)

Engine trouble on our sailboat caused unexpected delays. My husband and I arrived at the mouth of the Fraser River as the wind was calm and the sun was setting. At dusk, we motored upriver. It was nearly impossible to see hazards in the water, but we had to keep going so we could find a place to moor.

I pulled out our big light. Gene steered the sailboat while I stood on the deck holding a three-thousand-lumen spotlight (equivalent to the light of three thousand candles). Steel navigational buoys located fourteen hundred feet apart dotted the length of that section of the river, marking the lanes in which incoming and outgoing vessels traveled. Colliding with one could seriously damage a hull, which is the body of the boat. My task was to find these markers and shine the light on them so Gene could steer away from them. Trying to navigate the river without that light would have been treacherous, foolish, and nearly impossible.

Jesus knew that navigating life successfully in spiritual darkness was impossible for mankind. He loved us so much that He came to earth and died for us (John 3:16). He revealed Himself as the light of life (John 1:4). He unveiled the enemy's tactics and lies so we could steer clear of them (James 4:7). I can't imagine navigating life apart from the light of Jesus any more than I can motor safely upriver in the dark. —Grace Fox

THURSDAY, JULY 6

Monday through Friday, I hear familiar voices joyfully bidding each other good morning before the prayer leader mutes the phone line and starts with his or her own welcome and a short devotional before beginning our time in prayer.

It's great to start my day in communal prayer with like-minded believers who know the power of coming together before the Lord. We pray for all sorts of things—healing for loved ones, courage to face the day, protection of our leaders, peace in our country, safety for our children, restoration of relationships, unwavering faith, and more. The prayer leader will often unmute the line for a few seconds during our fifteen minutes together so we can collectively call out the names of people or situations we want to lift up to Jesus, trusting that He will answer us in due time. I don't know who's saying what in the cacophony of voices, but I know that Jesus hears.
